## Offset Fills

- 1. Make a rectangle, wider than it is long, Fill of black, Stroke to none.
- 2. Effect>Stylize>Scribble then mess with sliders for desired effect (variation to 20)
- 3. While still selected, Object>Expand Appearance and apply Charcoal Thin brush from Brushes Palette.
- 4. Drag that object into the Swatches Palette to make a custom swatch.
- 5. Type "Offset Fills" in a large, bold serif font (i.e. Caslon) and select it with the Type Tool. (The words need to fit in the rectangle you made above)
- 6. Open Appearance Palette and select the fill attribute, then click on your scribble swatch in the Swatches Palette. (Now expand it again before you move it)
- 7. Make a copy and apply steps 8 11 to that copy.
- 8. Select type object with Selection Tool
- 9. From Appearance Palette fly-out, "Add New Fill." (It will be black by default).
- 10. With new fill still selected, Effect>Path>Offset Path, check the preview box and enter –1 pt for Offset. (You may need to change your preferences to points instead of inches!)
- 11. Select type object with Selection Tool and Effect>Distort&Tranform>Roughen and input 0.4 pt for Size and choose Absolute in the dialog box. (Corner or smooth makes little difference)
- NOTE: This offsetting effect is used anytime you want something to look a little less definite . . . perhaps a good way to grunge and existing font.
